CFMS Makes Changes in its Bylaws

We are pleased to announce that The Board of Trustees of the Columbus Folk Music Society proposed updates and changes in its bylaws in order to encourage diversity and greater participation from its members.

Until now board members were added to the board for one-year terms without any limits to the number of terms a trustee may serve. The proposed changes make terms more consistent with other non-profits and encourage an on-going search for new trustees with specific talents that may meet the demands of CFMS' organizational needs.

As our organization continues to grow, we feel these changes will greatly enhance its ability to prosper as well as engage more of our enthusiastic membership base.

The changes in the bylaws are limited to just a couple of sections of its bylaws and are written here in caps:

Article IV. Membership, Section 7. The Society is committed to a policy of fair representation and will not discriminate on the basis of ethnicity, national origin, disabling condition, gender IDENTIFICATION, religion, sexual orientation, or age.

[Note: this change was added in order to remain current and to ensure the organization's commitment to inclusion.]

Article V. Board of Trustees, Section 2 Terms of Office.

- a. The term of office for members of the Board is THREE yearS commencing on July 1 and ending on June 30 of the THIRD year. Trustees are eligible for re-election FOR UP TO TWO TERMS. SUBSEQUENT TO THE END OF THE SECOND TERM TRUSTEES MAY BE ELECTED FOLLOWING ONE YEAR OF ABSENCE.
- b. (No changes)
- c. If a Board member dies, resigns, or is removed, the Board may decide to select an Interim Trustee to serve OUT THE REMAINING TERM PERIOD. THAT TRUSTEE WILL THEN BE ELIGIBLE FOR ELECTION BY THE MEMBERSHIP FOR UP TO TWO NEW TERMS AT THE next general membership meeting at which Officers and Trustees are elected.

[Note: These changes will enable the board to plan for replacements of board vacancies and the three-year terms will assure that trustee turnover will be manageable].

e. BOARD MEMBER TERMS SHALL BE STAGGERED IN ORDER TO ASSURE CONTINUITY.


The above changes were presented and approved at the June Annual Meeting of the Membership along with the Slate of Trustees and Officers for the 2022-2023 term.

For another treat, Mary plans to morph into her "cousin," the late great country music comedienne Minnie Pearl, complete with her hat and its price tag.

Having done dozens of comedy shows across Ohio and beyond, Mary sees positive benefits in comedy.

"I believe laughter and being fully present in life to observe 'the funny' around us in our everyday lives & relationships can truly lead to a healthier life and state of mind," Mary says. "AND it is FUN and we can all use more fun in our lives. Humor connects us in a way that nothing else can do."

Following Mary's comedy set, Mike will join her on stage for a round of Americana songs. It's a fairly modern genre that Mike describes as a fusion of folk and country music about "love, loss, and life, heavy on storytelling." Some of these songs they'll perform as a duo, but Mike and Mary also promise a few solos. Many will be pop, rock, folk, and country tunes from the 1950's, 60's, and 70's.

Actually, Mike recalls that Mary was the first person he ever performed with

nearly 25 years ago when he was just beginning to build the confidence heneeded to share his music with the world. "I met her at an open mic, and she didn't play guitar at that time," Mike explains. "She asked if anyone in the place could accompany her, and I volunteered. The song was 'Love at the Five and Dime,' and we still sometimes do that song together."

At the August 28 concert, songs like that by Americana specialist Nanci Griffith will be in the spotlight, along with tunes by John Prine, Cheryl Wheeler, Guy Clark, Bob Dylan, Dan Fogelberg, Todd Snider, and other compelling singer-songwriters.

Mike was a key player in Halfway Home, a Columbus Americana band that performed all across Ohio and beyond for more than a decade. Like Mary, he continues to perform as a solo act and to lead local open mic nights. Mary and Mike share a wonderful warm on-stage chemistry, and they hope you'll join them August 28 to share in it.

Stamp Announcement 22-25: Pete Seeger Stamp



THE STAMP – On July 21, 2022, in Newport, RI, the United States Postal Service® issued a newswire announcing the release of its Pete Seeger Stamp. "Famed folk singer Pete Seeger [1919-2014] was honored today as he was inducted into the Postal Service's Music Icons Forever stamp series at the Jane Pickens Theater."

"The Postal Service is pleased to present our new Music Icons stamp honoring Pete Seeger, a man who inspired countless musicians and millions of fans around the world," said Tom Foti, the Postal Service's product solutions vice president, who served as the stamp ceremony's dedicating official. "He was not only a champion of traditional American music, he was also celebrated as a unifying power by promoting a variety of causes, such as, civil rights, workers' rights, social justice, the peace movement and protecting the environment."

The other participants at the stamp ceremony were members of Seeger's family; Chris Funk, music director of the Newport Folk Festival Presents For Pete's Sake; and Béla Fleck, who performed the national anthem.

The stamp art features a color-tinted, black-and-white photograph taken in the early 1960s by Dan Seeger, the performer's son. Pete Seeger is shown in profile singing and playing his iconic banjo.

"It is an honor to see a photo of my father I'd taken some 60 years ago become this wonderful Forever stamp," said Dan Seeger. "My dad did most of his correspondence by hand — written letters — and I can imagine him smiling and of course appreciating this great honor because he relied on the U.S. Mail with its simplicity and honesty, knowing that thoughts and ideas can go from the sender over a tremendous expanse to a single receiver and get delivered."

Sold in panes of 16, the square stamp pane resembles a vintage 45 rpm record sleeve. One side of the pane includes the stamps and the image of a sliver of a record seeming to peek out the top of the sleeve. A larger version of the stamp-art photograph appears on the reverse side with the words "Pete Seeger FOLK SINGER." Art director Antonio Alcalá designed the issuance. Dan Seeger's photograph was color-tinted by Kristen Monthei.
