

## Let's Recall 110th Birthday of Woody Guthrie – followed by Special Tribute Concert Sunday, Sept 11

Sunday, September 11 from 1 to 3:30 pm, the Society will pay tribute to Guthrie and some of his musical devotees in an afternoon of songs held outdoors at Nocterra Brewing Co. in Powell. Ray Ray's Hog Pit will offer food.

Not only was Woody Guthrie one of American's most prolific songwriters and a true poet of the people, he also can be considered one of the most significant figures in American Folk music. Bob Dylan, Phil Ochs, Pete Seeger, Billy Bragg and Tom Paxton (amongst others) have ALL acknowledged Guthrie as a major influence in their musical achievements.

Woodrow Wilson Guthrie was born in Okemah, OK July 14, 1912, the third child of Nora and Charley Guthrie. Woody's father was ambitious, a land trader, and an eloquent writer who had a keen interest in politics.



Woody's daughter, Nora says: "I would say all the outward skills that one needs for success in the world, that's what Woody picked up from his dad. He picked up writing capabilities and also a respect for thought, debate and books."1

Nora adds her dad's mother was equally important in Woody's early years in that she sang a lot of the old Scots-Irish ballads and played the piano. "Everyone has his or her connection to what that maternal love is and to Woody it was music."2

Nora says it was then that Woody acquired a deep sense of empathy and compassion. As the ravages of Huntington's Disease increasingly took its toll on his mother, the townspeople made fun of her. "He was so hurt by that. He understood at a very early age what it was to have misfortune handed to you by fate . . . you find that motif also running through every single song that Woody wrote."3

In the mid-1930s, young Woody and his wife Mary found themselves in the midst of the Great Depression and a drought that had hit the midwestern plains. It was then Woody "first realized the power of music to capture the truth about people and places. In thinking back about this time, he wrote, 'there on the Texas plains right in the dead center of the dust bowl, with the oil boom over and the wheat blowed out and the hard-working people just stumbling about, bothered with mortgages, debts, bills, sickness, worries of every blowing kind, I seen there was plenty to make up songs about."'4

In Scott Alarik's article entitled "Writings in the Key of You" he quotes Nora as saying: "
'Woody always wrote in the key of you. . . .
He was always putting himself in the shoes of people he met along the way. He's the fly on the wall in everybody's life." Alarik continues: "As personal as Woody's songs feel, Nora Guthrie says he was rarely writing about himself. About songwriting, he wrote: 'I look through your eyes to see the hill you're standing on', and 'Every word I ever wrote was something I heard from somebody else. My job is to tell you something you already know." 6

Alarik summarizes by saying: "Woody was his own best yarn. His life spilled out like lore, punctuated by highways, rivers, labor camps and stormy oceans, peopled by hobos and intellectuals, labor radicals and lovers, immigrant refugees and compadres named Lefty Lou, Cisco, and Lead Belly. His life, and how he lived it, was the best ballad he left us, and the song that makes all the other songs true." 7

## Longtime Board Members Step Down

Three of the longest-serving members of the CFMS Board will be stepping down this year. Hugh Farthing, Linda McDonald and Dan Clarke have volunteered their time and energy for many years as part of the Folk Music Society's Board. They will be stepping away from their Board responsibilities but will continue to be active in various activities of the organization.

Hugh Farthing served as President and Vice President of the organization, in addition to being a Trustee member. He and Linda McDonald have managed the Bob Kirby Scholarship Program in recent years. The Bob Kirby Scholarship is awarded each year to one or two promising young folk musicians. Hugh also has taken responsibility for management of logistics for the Americana/Folk Concert series (coffeehouse) concerts. He is a volunteer worker at various CFMS Folk Festivals, and most recently he coordinated the workshop that taught young Festival goers how to make guitars out of cigar boxes.

Hugh has been a key figure in the folk music outreach effort that brings our folk singers to various nursing homes in the greater Columbus area. When the COVID

pandemic made personal visits impossible, Hugh continued to provide nursing home concerts via ZOOM technology. Hugh Farthing can be seen on a regular basis these days singing folk songs every Saturday with the Worthington Square players.

As mentioned, Linda McDonald and Hugh Farthing worked together for years on the Kirby Scholarships as well as being involved in other major contributions. "Since being a mom, I was always interested in making a fun Children's Tent at the Central Ohio Folk Festival, which I have tried to do since 2007. I [also] try to capture all the fun of our festival in my photographs." Linda has also hosted a number of folk music picnics and get-togethers at her home. Linda is a charter member of the Worthington Square players and her lilting flute melodies can be heard every Saturday and whenever the Worthington Squares provide musical background for activities throughout Franklin County.

Dan Clarke has been a workhorse in CFMS' varied outreach concerts. Not only does he play on Saturday mornings with the Worthington Squares, Dan is in the center of things any time the Folk Music Society is asked to provide music, whether at a children's concert at Franklin Park or a folk music session at the Franklin Country Fair. Dan Clarke has also been a stalwart volunteer at many CFMS activities, most recently partnering with Hugh Farthing at the recent Folk Festival.

These three mainstays of the Folk Music Society should be applauded for their Board service over the years.

Woody's granddaughter, Sarah Lee Guthrie, also a musician, says, "Making music with him, "I really feel like he was with me, dancing in front of me, waving his arms and saying 'Hey, let's do this.'. . .I think Woody is a part of everybody who loves him."8

There is no doubt that Woody Guthrie's songs and legacy has and continues to have a major influence on American culture and we will be paying tribute to that in mid-September. Event coordinator and Woody Guthrie portrayer Jeff Putnam explains, "This is a great chance to hear talented local musicians perform both new and old songs written or inspired by the founding father of American folk music."
